# We're all part of the jigsaw!



## The Revd Ros writes ...

I expect many of you have done a number of jigsaws over the past year in order to pass the time. Tim and I completed a 1000-piece jigsaw of Welford village which a relative had found in a charity shop in Bolton!

But hopefully, now is the time when we can begin to put our jigsaw puzzles to one side and start to mix again with our family, friends and neighbours – a time when we can retake our place in the big picture of life itself.

As Christians we are each part of a jigsaw – and not just a 1000-piece jigsaw. We are individually holders of one piece of the 2.4 billion-piece jigsaw of Christianity. But as well as holding the piece of jigsaw that makes me a Christian, I also hold a piece of the jigsaw in which the whole population of the world holds a piece too - one piece of the 7 billion-piece jigsaw of humanity.

Those jigsaws are perhaps a bit too big for us to imagine being a part. Closer to home we each hold a piece of the jigsaw that makes us part of the Benefice of Lower Quinton with Admington, Welford, Weston and Marston Sicca – at the last count probably part of at least a 7000-piece puzzle.

And as a holder of that one piece of jigsaw we are part of God's plan for the world and for our community. Of course, we are all different! In jigsaw terms we are different colours and shapes, and we fit together with some and not with others. But you know, without me and you the jigsaw just is not complete. Not only that, if we are not in place, it is difficult for the other pieces to fit into their place.

## A place for each of us in our community

So as we move out of 'lockdown' and go forward into the future together, perhaps we can all think about what our personal piece of the jigsaw looks like and who we might connect with in order that we can complete the picture and take our place in our church and community.

Each of us, no matter how small, is significant in the life of our community and we all have a role to play. We've all got individual gifts that we can use to share the love of Christ with those around us – even if that's a simple smile or a helping hand.

As our churches reopen, we're trying to make it possible for more people to join us in the church jigsaw by planning different types of services and activities which will enable more people to connect with us. ## St Swithin's Churchwardens' Report

It has been lovely to see so many people in person in Church over the last month. Places are still limited with booking necessary along with social distancing. Hopefully we will be allowed to meet in a more normal way soon. A new Family Communion Service has proved very popular. The content is very child friendly but also fun for all ages.

We are very pleased with the uptake of the 200 Club. We almost managed to sell our target of 200 tickets - next year we hope we can make it the 300 Club! The first monthly draw was on Friday 14<sup>th</sup> May and the winning ticket numbers were: 1<sup>st</sup> 136; 2<sup>nd</sup> 58; and 3<sup>rd</sup> 34.

**The Craft group** has been meeting in a group of 6 in the garden. We are hoping we can transfer to the church as soon as we are allowed. We have many people making some amazing and varied things for the Christmas Craft Fair on 4th December. If you would like to join us, have ideas or are making things at home please let us know. The plan is to hold a Craft production day once we are allowed to all get together.

**Did this really happen?** Since the last Newsletter I have been told of two youths smelling of substance trying to kick in the phone box, two young girls being offered drugs in the Quinton Village Hall car park, and girls needing to seek an adult's help to safely get home.

We do operate CCTV for the Village Hall and Play Area and in the event of issues in this area the recorded footage may be reviewed by request to the parish clerk.

It is not the Parish Council's role to police these nor report them unless Parish property is affected but it is for anyone seeing such activity to report it directly to the Police either by dialling 999 if activity is in process or 101 if immediate response not required. No one should be getting away with these things or they will only get worse.

A new swing seat has been installed at Quinton Play Area. It was bought to provide a facility for young ones with physical issues where support is needed. Since installation the harness has been subject to multiple interference and damage and must now be replaced. However it will not be left in the seat but loaned out to be used where need exists.

The damage to the seat was captured on CCTV and the incident reported to Police who will follow up appropriately.

**Play Area Zip Wire:** A change was made by the installer but still the Zip Wire lacks motion. A further change is being sought which hopefully will allow a less restricted movement.

**Litter:** On a daily basis rubbish is dropped around the Parish particularly around the play areas in Quinton and Meon Vale and so often within an arm's length of a bin. Do your children know that is just wrong? Some certainly do not seem to.

**Parish Council Meetings** are no longer permitted via video link and will be returning to being held in the Quinton and Admington Village Hall.

**The Pavilion Café (Meon Vale)** The coffee machine has arrived and is plumbed in. A few matters still need tidying up but hopefully before the end of May it will be open.

## District Councillor's annual report 2020-21

#### Covid-19 & SDC

The District Council helped with the delivery of food parcels, financial support and grants, found shelter for rough sleepers, involved with the staffing and infrastructure of testing and vaccination centres. The local community responded so compassionately with volunteering to help those who are vulnerable. Thank you to everyone who helped look after our neighbours.

#### **Planning**

## Upper Quinton – application for eight houses on Meon Hill

I put in a strong objection and thank you to everyone who has done the same. At the time of writing, we await the outcome from the Council. I expect a decision in mid-May. If we don't get the right outcome, I will fight this at a Planning Committee.

#### Meon Woodland - Rural 4

I was successful in changing council policy. This is a major result for the long-term future of the site. By working together we can change council policy for the better.

#### Petrol station on Campden Rd

I supported the application for the car wash to become a service station because it is unacceptable that residents have to travel to far for fuel. This has now been approved.

#### Housing Association

I have had a significant amount of casework regarding Orbit housing in the Parish. It has been tough but very rewarding to help local residents with housing problems.

#### **Green Waste Collections**

This service begun in April with over 42,000 subscribers recorded across the District.

## BT Broadband

It was good to see the Openreach vans out and about in the Parish in April following the District Council's scheme. We are all looking forward to having faster broadband.

## **CCTV Cameras**

We had a bid accepted for CCTV at Meon Vale via CIL funding, 2 cameras and 10 years' worth of surveillance. I am pleased with this result and this is good news for community safety.

## Honeybourne/Stratford Railway

Since becoming a councillor I have had the ambition to change the District Council's position so it would support the re-opening of the rail link between Honeybourne & Stratford. I am delighted that the Council are now exploring the options.

## Vice-Chairman of the Council

The small allowance I received as Council Vice-Chairman has been used to support the pub, Shipston Home Nursing and a local resident's fundraising efforts for charity.

## **Quinton Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)**

Quinton Parish Council (QPC) has prepared a draft NDP containing policies that will help shape future development in the parish. QPC has agreed with Stratford District Council (SDC) that the draft NDP can now be shared with residents for a six-week consultation period May 17 – June 27. This stage in the process is known as Regulation 14 Pre-Submission consultation. QPC is required to review any comments made by residents on the draft NDP before a final version is submitted to SDC. This final version will be reviewed by an external examiner and if the Plan is passed by the examiner then the Plan will be put to a residents' vote in a referendum which would be held later this year.

The full draft Plan with maps etc can be found on the NDP website at www.quinton-plan.org together with other useful NDP documents. In this Newsletter, there follows the policy proposals in the Plan.

We would ask that residents review these and any comments should be sent by email to consultation@quinton-plan.org or posted to Councillor Paul Milliken, Four Thatches, Friday Street, Lower Quinton CV37 8SQ.

Comments need to be received before June 28 to be considered.

No personal information, such as email addresses, will be used or retained by QPC.

We are hoping to arrange at least one opportunity during June for residents to view details of the Plan with maps etc in the Village Hall. This is subject to the QPC being satisfied that this can be done consistent with Govt Covid guidance.

One word on the Housing Proposals. SDC is required to identify so called 'reserve sites' so that these can be called upon in case there is a shortfall in the housing numbers required across the District. We know from our previous survey that most residents do not want additional housing built that would extend the boundaries of the Lower and Upper Quinton villages. However it makes sense for our NDP to identify at least one potential site in order that we can influence where any potential future housing might be built. The site on Goose Lane that we have identified is estimated by SDC to be able to take 30 houses and is the 'least worst' option in the view of your Parish Council.

## NDP Proposals @ May 2021

### 1. HOUSING: Future Housing

Proposals for new dwellings within the Built Up Area Boundary (BUAB) of Lower Quinton and the BUAB of Upper Quinton will be supported in principle.

All areas outside the BUAB are classed as countryside. New dwellings within the countryside will be strictly controlled and limited to Rural Exception Sites, replacement dwellings and dwellings that are essential for rural workers, development that would represent the optimal viable use of a heritage asset or would be appropriate enabling development to secure the future of heritage assets, the re-use of redundant or disused buildings which enhances immediate setting, the subdivision of an existing dwelling or a new dwelling, the design of which is of exceptional quality It is proposed that a reserve site is identified in order that the Plan makes a positive contribution towards potential future housing development in the Neighbourhood Area.

The location of the identified reserve site is on Goose Lane (East) immediately north of the new Quinton Fields development.

It is proposed that an updated landscape sensitivity assessment is provided as part of any future planning application for the reserve site. This assessment needs to pay specific attention to the proximity of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

#### 2. HOUSING: Design and Layout

All new development proposals should have regard to the key guiding design principles below and the Design Guide contained within the Plan taking full account of the historic character and heritage assets within the Neighbourhood Plan Area.

The key guiding design principles are:

The rural character of the Neighbourhood Plan Area should be preserved and enhanced, and urbanisation avoided.

The rural landscape setting should be conserved, and views into, out of and within the villages protected.

The important informal balance between open and built areas should be maintained and where possible, enhanced.

The location of new housing or other development should not compromise the open character of the villages including significant views and aspects.

New building, including extensions, conversions and alterations, should where possible improve the quality of the public realm and should complement and be in sympathy with the surrounding architecture in the Neighbourhood Area, in terms of size, scale, quality of design, materials, existing character, housing density and distribution.

Good quality innovative design will be encouraged where it is sympathetic to its setting in terms of size, scale and materials and where it reflects and complements the immediate local environment and maximises sustainability benefits.

New development should strive for design excellence.

New housing, including layout and orientation, will be sensitive to the setting, existing built form, neighbouring uses, landscape character and topography of the site and locality. Proposals should reflect the context of the locality, ensuring a continuity of key design features (see Design Guide). Conventional estate layouts which are more suited to suburban areas should be avoided.

Development of existing agricultural buildings and farm buildings should respect the rural character of the villages and hamlets.

Development proposals which fail to satisfactorily consider and implement these design principles, as appropriate, will not be supported unless there is significant justification which indicates otherwise.

#### 3. GREEN SPACES

This Plan designates the following areas of Local Green Space as defined at the following locations in the Neighbourhood Area:

- 1. Swithin's Wood: three parcels of green space within the development
- 2. Millfield Close Green: a small green with trees
- 3. Quinton Primary School: the playing field at the rear of the school
- 4. Neighbourhood Area playing fields: the large field and recreation area by the Village Hall
- 5. Allotments off Back Lane: community allotments on Church land
- 6. St. Swithin's Church: includes the graveyard and other land within the Church boundary
- 7. Village green: the green areas between and around the College Arms and the Church
- 8. New green on Main Road: the green at the front of the Quinton Fields development
- 9. The Firs: a small green at the entry to the Firs housing area
- 10. Fordway: the green at the heart of the Fordway development
- 11. Goose Lane green: a triangular green area within the Goose Lane housing area
- 12. Thackery Close: a small green within the dense housing of this area
- 13. Upper Quinton: the large village green at the heart of Upper Quinton
- 14. Upper Quinton: the orchard by Upper Quinton Green
- 15. Meon Vale: several parcels of green space within the Neighbourhood Area boundaries of this large development

Development that would harm the openness or special character of a Local Green Space or its significance and value to the local community will not be supported unless there are very special circumstances which outweigh the harm to the Local Green Space.

#### 4. VALUED LANDSCAPES

Development proposals should ensure that any impacts on valued landscapes, and important views and skylines, as listed in the Plan are minimised, and mitigated especially where they relate to heritage assets, rising land, village approaches, settlement boundaries and to and from the AONB.

Development proposals should ensure that all valued landscapes, and important vistas and skylines, as listed in the Plan are maintained and safeguarded, particularly where they relate to heritage assets, rising land, village approaches, settlement boundaries and to and from the AONB.

In particular, proposals need to ensure conformity with the specific protections given to the AONB in national and district policies.

#### 5. DARK SKIES

Where relevant, lighting within new developments should be limited to what is required for personal safety.

#### 6. RIDGE AND FURROW

The fields in the Neighbourhood Area that have evidence of Ridge and Furrow should be protected and preserved as far as possible as important and rare heritage assets. Proposals which would result in the partial or complete loss of ridge and furrow will only be permitted if there are exceptional circumstances.

#### 7. BIODIVERSITY

Development will not be supported unless it protects, enhances and/or restores habitat biodiversity.

Where necessary, development proposals will be expected to demonstrate that they will:

Provide a net gain in biodiversity where possible

Protect or enhance biodiversity assets

Avoid negative impacts on existing biodiversity

Development will only be supported in areas where Notable Bird Species or other rare or vulnerable wildlife or plant species are present as long as it can be demonstrated that it does not affect the conservation status of such species.

#### 8. AQUATIC HABITAT

The village pond in Lower Quinton should be preserved so it can continue to provide a habitat for wildfowl and aquatic life thus protecting its value as an amenity to be enjoyed by the Neighbourhood Area.

#### 9. INFRASTRUCTURE: Flood Risk

Proposals will only be supported if they satisfactorily identify and address the risk of flooding in line with Planning Policy and Guidance at national and local level Appropriate Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS) will be proportionally incorporated in all scales of development.

SuDS features must be located outside areas of identified flood risk.

Proposals on sites crossed by a watercourse must include a site-specific flood risk assessment that includes modelling of the watercourse with SuDS features located outside areas of risk in accordance with Warwickshire County Council Flood Risk & Drainage Standing Advice.

Infiltration and above ground SuDS attenuation, such as swales, ponds and other water based ecological systems, should be used.

Where mitigation measures involve cut off ditches, balancing ponds and/or similar, proposals should demonstrate the means by which these shall be maintained to ensure their satisfactory performance in perpetuity.

Proposals should include opening up any existing culverts for greater amenity and biodiversity benefits where practicable.

Proposals including new culverts should minimize the length and be built in accordance with Warwickshire County Council Guidance and have appropriate approvals.

#### 10. INFRASTRUCTURE: Foul Water Drainage Mitigation

All new development must demonstrate adequate means of foul drainage in line with Building Regulations and submit evidence to demonstrate sufficient capacity exists within the system.

Proposals to erect new dwellings should include measures to:

Store discharges of foul water from the development and prevent its discharge into the public foul water sewer unless capacity is available to accept it without contributing to existing overload 'down-stream';

Prevent pressurised foul water from back feeding from the public sewer into the property or its curtilage.

Suitable techniques for "domestic grey water recycling" should be adopted where it will reduce the volume of 'buffer' storage required above.

Developers shall ensure that foul and surface water from new development and redevelopment are kept separate. Where sites which are currently connected to combined sewers are redeveloped, the opportunity to disconnect surface water and highway drainage from combined sewers shall be taken.

Should any connections into combined systems be unavoidable, the system should remain separate on site up to the point of connection.

## 11. FOOTPATHS, CYCLEWAYS AND BRIDLEWAYS

As appropriate, development proposals should demonstrate how walking and cycling opportunities have been prioritised and connections made to existing routes. Proposals which either adversely affect existing walking and cycling routes or do not encourage appropriate new walking and cycling opportunities will not be supported.

#### 12. HERITAGE AND ARCHAEOLOGICAL ASSETS

The Neighbourhood Plan Area's historic environment will be protected and enhanced for its inherent value and for the enjoyment of present and future residents and visitors. This includes designated heritage assets such as Listed Buildings, sites of archaeological importance and non-designated heritage assets.

New proposals will be high quality, sensitively designed and integrated with the historic context and informed by an understanding of the significance of the historic asset and environment.



## **Quinton's Stratford Sisters**

Joan Crooks, who died in January this year, was one of five sisters, known as the 'Stratford Girls' (Stratford being their maiden name).



Born between 1931 and 1948, all five grew up in Quinton and then spent all their lives in the village, apart from Rose, who lived in Ireland for a short time before returning to Quinton.

Joan, who had lived in Lower Clopton and Upper Quinton before moving to St Swithin's Drive, was a mother of three, Sue, Mark and Julie; grandmother to five and great-grandmother to four. Speaking about Joan, her sister Wendy said: "She had suffered a lot from illness all her life

## Where have all the wild flowers gone?

Looking at all of the wild flowers in our beautiful churchyard, which has been lovingly and carefully managed, I wonder whether it would be possible to include the grass verges and the greens in this type of care.

Nowadays, all local councils are being asked to mow less often to encourage the regeneration of the many wild flowers and wildlife, much of which are being lost. A few years ago there were cuckoo flowers (lady's smock) and cowslips on Upper Quinton Green, but alas, no more. The cow parsley on the verges used to be a joy to see in May, but not nowadays, we have to go well outside the villages to enjoy the sight. Of course, mowing close to the roads is sometimes essential for safety but perhaps not the whole width of the verge. These could be cut and cleared only once, later in the year after the wildflowers have seeded. This is being done in and around many parishes countrywide.

Most of the time our walks culminated in a visit to a pond, either the small,

natural one in Harper's, the field beyond the playing field, or the Sand Pool in Back Lane. This pool used to be the village cart wash and had a single wooden bar fence dividing it from the road. Everyone leaned over this bar and watched for tadpoles, minnows and sticklebacks. There were also lots of newts

in there, hanging motionless and visible against the old Cotswold stone lining at the front of the pond.

I remember that in my last year at Quinton Junior School, our teacher, Mr Ainsworth, took us to the pond in Harper's. On this occasion we children took along jam jars which we dipped into the shallow edges of the pond. Mr Ainsworth sieved the contents of the jars and found caddis fly larvae.

After all this excitement, we all re-formed into our 'crocodile' for the walk back to our classroom. Once there some of us grated different colours of chalk to put into a small aquarium. Mr Ainsworth somehow gently removed the larvae from their cases and put them into the aquarium too. I can't remember how long the process took, but the larvae made themselves pretty cases out of the chalk! We children were enchanted.
